People use 'mediaeval' as a synonym for retrograde or barbarous. This is very annoying. It is also a way of sniping at the church because the Middle Ages are associated with the height of influence of the Catholic Church. The Middles Ages, however, were rich in art, architecture and learning.

In 1957 the Dominican, Marie-Dominique Chenu, wrote of the twelfth century: 'we find ourselves in an age when, in the West, Christian people, thanks to the spread of culture and thanks even more to a sensational apostolic awakening, became collectively aware of their environment and sought to rationalise it.'

Just recently a newspaper in Europe decried the resources used in the construction of Notre Dame de Paris and claimed that this prolonged the Middle Ages. It was silly and uninformed. Dom Jeremias Schröder responded that the building of the great gothic cathedrals led to 'the development of highly complex construction sites, to massive progressive in the fields of architecture, technology, and organisation. That the schools at these cathedrals were the forerunners of European universities does not have a lot, to be sure, to do with the Gothic style – but it's not entirely unrelated either.' The great and old universities of Europe have their beginnings as cathedral schools or religious houses.

In many ways women were better off in the Mediaeval period than the early modern, for example, in Mediaeval Anglo-Saxon kingdoms, 'women made up a sizeable proportion of the part of the population that was literate. In Anglo-Saxon times, literacy was highest among monks, nuns, priests and other clergy, who had committed to a religious life. Religious women, such as abbesses, were at the forefront of several literary developments.' (Alison Hudson) There were abbesses who governed significant territory and all the male clergy within it!

Finally, the end of the Middle Ages brought, amongst other things, 'persecution of witches, wars of religion, and absolutism' (Schröder); a longer Middle Ages might have brought more benefits!

So next time you hear someone say something is 'medieval' ask them if they mean it is rich in learning, innovation, culture, art and architecture!
